Conflict of Interest

Dear Mike:

Issue:

It is our understanding a major utility company has proposed construction of a transmission line. In this connection, the utility company has proposed two alternative routes traversing through the county. Both routes will impact landowners located within the county. We further understand one of the alternative routes will traverse through property owned or under the control of a county board member.

The county board is considering adopting a resolution recommending a preferred route for the construction of the transmission line.

Question:

If the county board elects to participate in adopting a resolution supporting a recommended transmission line route, may a county board member where property may be impacted participate in the discussion and voting on such resolution?

Analysis:

A conflict of interest may occur if the county board member receives a direct or indirect benefit from action taken by the county board. Conflicts of interest may generally be classified into two (2) categories: statutory conflict of interest and common law conflict of interest.

A statutory conflict of interest occurs when a specific statutory provision enacted by the Illinois General Assembly expressly prohibiting certain specific conduct. A common law conflict of interest are activities deemed by the courts as directly or indirectly creating a conflict of interest by virtue of an appointed or elected official acting on a subject whereby the elected or appointed official may receive a benefit.

Conclusion:

It is our opinion a county board member owning or controlling property that may be impacted by the installation of a transmission line may not participate in any discussion or vote on a resolution supporting/recommending or opposing a specific transmission line route.

A related question relates to the appropriateness for the county board to adopt a resolution supporting or opposing transmission line routes. The county board should identify the public interest or purpose supporting/recommending or opposing a transmission line route.
